Key road project about to get going

▶ In late October, Northeast Loop 820 and Airport Freeway preparations begin. ■ Toll lanes and better frontage roads and ramps are part of 4-year overhaul.

A new agreement on Interstate 35W work includes a makeover of the poorly designed interchange at Northeast Loop 82O and removal of all left-lane exits — and getting those new lanes open by 2017. 5-17/Paul Moseley

A \$2-billion-plus makeover of Northeast Loop 820 and Airport Freeway is just around the corner.

The developer of the North Tarrant Express project plans to hold an open house Oct. 27 in Hurst to help people understand how an estimated four years of road work will affect their lives. By late October, motorists may notice crews preparing the roadsides for cranes and other heavy machinery.

The project includes the reconstruction of existing lanes, the addition of toll lanes, and better frontage roads and ramps.

Also, state officials have reached a tentative deal with a developer to rebuild Interstate 35W from Interstate 30 near downtown Fort Worth to North Tarrant Parkway and to add toll lanes by 2017.



With all the talk about the \$1 billion DFW Connector project un-der way in Grapevine, Tarrant County motorists may not realize that an even bigger project is about to kick off just down the road.

Almost before it was over, Tuesday's crisis involving a University of Texas at Austin student toting an AK-47 across campus and killing himself reignited the debate on allowing concealed handguns at colleg-


